She had a wealth of interests: she loved dancing and was taking line dancing so she could dance at the dragon boat regatta parties. She enjoyed going to the opera, plays and movies. Other loves were running and traveling. After retiring in 2006 she traveled to Europe, Hawaii, Vancouver Island, twice to Mexico and was planning a future trip to Greece or Italy. She was looking forward to paddling at the Naniamo Regatta in July, and was extremely excited about her September trip to Australia with the Deas crew.

Whatever Marg did, she put her whole heart into it. She truly epitomized what Abreast in A Boat is all about. She showed each and every one of us that there truly is life after breast cancer. A terrible and tragic accident took her life much too soon. We loved her smile, her passion, her enthusiasm and she will be deeply missed.
